Bringing people into focus at Richmond MH&A Services

Late last year, Richmond Mental Health & Addiction participated in a site assessment by the Institute of Patient & Family Centered Care (IPFCC). The institute reviewed our current services and provided recommendations for how to make them more person and family centered.

The institute's assessment -- in a nutshell -- is that we could do more to include our clients and their families in their care. This philosophy itself is rooted in the premise that families have a critical role to play in supporting affected people and that these individuals are our partners in care.

Building on the roadmap that the institute provided, Richmond MH&A is now implementing the necessary changes to promote and develop a more person and family-centered care environment.



From an overarching health authority perspective, this project also aligns nicely with Vancouver Coastal Health's strategic focus as a People First organization.

Who's involved?

All of Richmond MH&A, the Family Advisory Council (FAC), persons with lived experience, and Richmond Hospital Foundation.

What's your vision?

As a result of this work across Richmond MH&A, clients and families will be better informed, feel more welcome, and will be part of their care team. At the same time, clients will consistently experience care as a partner in their own journey towards wellness.

What's the deadline for this work?

We hope to have all recommendations implemented by the end of 2017.

Ready, Set...Go!

Project work to-date includes:

- IPFCC assessment and roadmap completed
- Project and clinical leads identified
- Steering committee established with monthly meetings. The committee includes family members, persons with lived experience, and representatives from every program and service across Richmond MH&A.
- Literature review to support Best Practice and evidence-informed services
