Background

Foundry Centres are integrated health and social service centres for young people ages 12-24. Foundry centres provide a single place for young people to access mental health care, substance use services, primary care, social services and youth and family peer supports. The goal is to provide safe, non-judgmental care, information and resources, in a youth and family friendly manner. Foundry brings health and social services from the community together to make it easier for young people to find the care, connection and support they need.

Foundry centres take a prevention and early intervention approach and will improve access and navigation of services by also including peer and family engagement and support. Foundry centres want to reach young people early so that help is available sooner and can address small problems before they become bigger ones.

Richmond Addictions Services will be the lead agency for developing a Foundry centre in Richmond and will be working with VCH as a partner. The Foundry Richmond centre will work in collaboration with the entire community and community agencies to ensure that Richmond young people, ages 12 – 24, will know where to go to access health and social services. The Richmond Foundry Centre will aim to reduce stigma associated with receiving mental health support by providing a variety of services in one youth-friendly place. The planned centre will enhance the services available to young people, but more importantly, it will bring more services together in one place in an integrated manner.

How we engaged





On June 18, 2019, Parents and family members were invited to participate in a



discussion about their hopes and concerns for Foundry Richmond. A focus group was



held to gather input to inform the planning and eventual activation of Foundry



Richmond.

What we asked

- 1. What are your hopes for Foundry and what it will mean for youth?
- 2. What are your concerns about Foundry?

These hopes and concerns were themed into topics for discussion. Parents and family members were asked what would be needed to support the stated hopes and what is needed to mitigate concerns.

Summary and Recommendations

- Ensure that youth have an active and ongoing voice in the planning, activation and ongoing evaluation of the space and services.
- Make the space safe for all youth and create a welcoming environment where youth are listened to and given access to services that are youth- centred.
- Ensure low or no barrier access through provision of services that are culturally safe, available at convenient hours, in the languages of those needing service, allow for virtual access and are respectful.
- Make space for families to be actively involved and able to access services as needed.
- Be clear on what youth and parents can expect in the way of services and support from Foundry
